Estlin/ Gray/ Riceton/ Bechard Centennial Celebration (July 23 and 24, 2005)

The communities of #306 Highway celebrated Saskatchewan Centennial on a beautiful July weekend. A morning that began with grey skies and a rumbling of thunder turned into a hot Saturday afternoon.

Celebrations began with the parade at 1PM – fifty entries made their way through the streets of Gray; from the ball diamonds to the Kelly farm road, up 3rd Avenue making the loop to come back down 2nd Avenue. A decision was made to do the circuit a second time – so, two trips around town were made. The parade was led by Don Moats driving a team of horses hitched to a democrat buggy (owned by the Little's) carrying long-time Gray residents, Darrell “Corky” and Betty Lafoy. Other entries included several displays of antique machinery and an entry of a present day sprayer. The Pitman Nudist Colony and the Lawnchair Brigade provided some comedic interludes. Many local businesses had entered floats.

The crowd of several hundred made their way to the park across from Gray Memorial Hall for the ‘opening ceremonies’ where a stage on two flatbeds had been built. The program led off with a welcome from MC Lori Boesch. The special guests were led on stage by Sarah Yeo (playing the bagpipes) and Andy Frisk (in RCMP regalia). The national anthem was performed by three generations; Sharon Frei (on piano), Karen Butel (her daughter singing) and Jordan Butel (Karen’s son on trumpet). The program included official addresses from Ralph Goodale (Minister of Finance), and Don McMorris (MLA for Indian Head/Milestone). Representatives had been invited from each community; Bill Gillis (as rep and Mayor of the day’s host town, Gray) spoke first – he emphasized volunteerism and the importance of ‘getting involved’ in our small town events. Roy Black (Estlin) talked about the changes in our area landscapes – the disappearance of the grain elevators – and how there used to be a farm at least every mile – and now you can drive stretches of road with no residents. Riceton rep was long-time resident Jean Coldwell (Purves) who spoke of family and history, what it was like growing up in a large family 65 years ago and some of her childhood memories. Con Bechard (Bechard) talked about farming and all of the changes in machinery, systems, constant cropping (chemicals) and how our farms have evolved. The ceremony included participation of the “Singing Friends and Neighbours”. The choir

performed the ‘Saskatchewan Song’ (written by Brad Johner for the Saskatchewan Centennial) and Dear Hearts. The speeches were interspersed with a couple of duets by Angela and Morgan Moats. They performed two numbers from the play Pull of the Land by Beth Robertson. The songs were Prairie Sentinels (disappearing elevators from our landscape) and Sky High (a tribute to our endless horizon and beautiful blue skies). The children from the communities also led a cheer for the four participating towns and a song called “This Town is Your Town”.

The ceremony was followed by an opportunity for the locals (and the coming homes) to participate in a ‘Talent Show’. The talent was spectacular and provided over an hour of entertainment.

The 306 Communities Sports Hall of Fame induction ceremonies followed on the outdoor stage and welcomed Crystal Frisk (of curling fame) and Mac Paton (baseball) to the list of honourees.

Throughout the day the Gray Memorial Hall was the site of the History Room, Ice Cream Parlour and Tea Room. The Estlin ladies coordinated displays from the four communities and provided a welcome visiting area inside protected from the hot sun. It was well attended throughout the day (and on Sunday afternoon as well) and had some interesting displays of items and photographs from days gone by.

There had been plywood laid on the rink floor (280 sheets – half one way, the other half on top the other direction – took a crew of 20 about 2 hours) to accommodate a Beer Garden for the afternoon and additional seating for the 550 people that enjoyed barbequed steak, baked potatoes, Caesar salad and homemade pies for dessert (a quantity of 100 donated by the older women of the communities – past and present residents). A DJ had been hired to provide the sound system for the day of activities and he provided music for the “Street Dance” that evening.

Sunday events began in Riceton the next morning with a Pancake Breakfast served to over 300 people from the booth at the sports grounds. Breakfast was followed by a day of activities hosted by the Riceton Recreation Committee entitled ‘Family Day’; kite flying, horseshoes, scrub ball games, etc. A Box Lunch was available for sale at the booth coordinated by the Riceton Ladies Committee.

Also that morning was an interdenominational church service held at Gray United Church. It was well attended (about 125 people). A 'volunteer' choir directed by Dianne Burrows got together on Saturday evening for a practice and performed beautifully. The Singing Friends and Neighbours sang as well and Dianne Burrows presented a solo. Accompanists were Debra (Frei) Mooney and Sharon Frei. The officiating minister was John Haas.

The weekend activities were over almost before they began. A great couple of days of events were enjoyed by all – comments were that there should have been some 'unscheduled time' for 'just visiting'. So, next time...we will do that (and have two lines for the buffet dinner!)

Gray Recreation Centre

The Gray rink continues to be the 'centre' of our community. Used by all from the surrounding towns and area it has become the winter hub of activities.

The week begins with the very successful 'Sunday Breakfasts'. Johnny Ford and his volunteer crew host an average of 75 people each week from early November to end of April. These breakfasts have been on the calendar since initiated by the Rink Board in 1983.

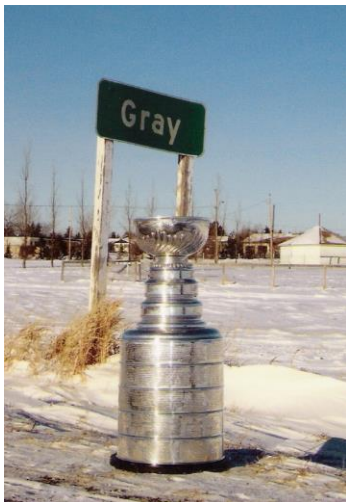
Henry has stepped into his place as the 'man on the grill'. Dishwashing is shared by able (and willing) volunteers coordinated by Randy Frei (he is often the dish pig – affectionately named if the recruiting has not gone well) and of course, the captain, Johnny Ford.

The Tuesday Night Card Party is held each week in the Heritage Room. Hosting is done by different couples each week, with all attendees providing the 'goodies' that are served with the tea and coffee.

Friday nights have developed (beginning in 2005) as a 'dinner party' evening. Different members of the community volunteer to prepare a meal for about 75 people. Menus vary each week and provide the locals with another excuse to head to the rink.

There are still a few hockey teams playing out of Gray. The Gray Hounds are an 8-and-under squad that provides a lot of hockey entertainment. The Screaming O's (senior – not sure if they can be categorized yet as 'masters' – over 45's) manage to recruit a couple of young bodies each year to remain somewhat competitive.

The highlight of 2005 was the chance for Gray to host the Stanley Cup. What was proposed as a day of activities turned into the unbelievable opportunity to have the Cup for four days in January (it was en route to Vancouver so the Hockey Hall of Fame offered it up to Gray for the extra days in between events). The Official Banquet was held at Gray Memorial Hall for a capacity crowd of 125. The Riceton Recreation Centre were contracted to cater the event and the guests dined on superb prime rib,



baked potatoes, salads and dessert. The guest speaker was Sam Richardson (of curling fame) who entertained everyone with his recollections. The next morning was a sponsor breakfast prior to the general public skate and opportunity to spend some time with the Stanley Cup. We chose to 'spread the wealth' and were able to provide the Cup to Milestone, Rouleau and Wilcox for some fundraising activities. The Cup visited a number of schools; Gray, Luther High

School in Regina and a school selected by Conexus (one of our sponsors) Wilfred Walker Public in Regina. It also visited the former winners that live in the area; Bill Hickie (passed away July 2005), Don Metz, and Bob Turner (passed away February 2005). The Saskatchewan Sport Hall of Fame in Regina also hosted the Stanley Cup one afternoon. This was the year of the NHL lockout so the Screaming O's played Big Bob's (one of their frequent opponents) for the Stanley Cup. The Screaming O's claimed victory, but in part, because they hosted the event!

The Gray rink continues to operate by counting on volunteer labour. Johnny Ford and Con Bechard have 'put in' the ice for years (and years). The Board contributes their time for all things rink – attending rental sessions, general maintenance and concession operation. Thanks to all!!!

Gray/Riceton District Girl Guides of Canada (submitted by Dolores (Dolly) Picard)

The Gray/Riceton District Branch of Girl Guides of Canada was started up in 1987 by Sandy Ackerman and me. We had both been leaders previously in Regina and we had both been involved as Brownies and Guides as young girls. There are many worthwhile objectives in guiding as it focuses on home/family, community and environment, this is accomplished by teaching girls to set short and long term goals for themselves. We ran Sparks, Brownies, Girl Guides and Pathfinders through our own registered District.

During the years we were in operation we had four volunteer leaders, me (Gray), Sandy Ackerman (Riceton), Rhonda Bleau (Gray) and Monique Love-Maynard (Riceton). We spent many hours every week preparing for meetings, activities and camps. Although not registered as leaders, we had a great deal of support from parents and non-parents for everything from teaching girls how to use snowshoes, the proper use of power tools, volunteering weekends at camps, tree planting, baking, cooking and helping with fundraisers and awards ceremonies for the girls.

We were a small group by city standards, but being small was always to our advantage. We were a very active group and able to accomplish more over less time than our larger counterparts. Our girls were all well decorated with badges. Two of our girls, Alyson Ford and Trudy Picard received their

Canada Cords from the Lieutenant Governor. The wonderful thing about being a guide leader in a small community is that you watch most of these girls grow up and see what they give back to their family, community and environment. We have at least one of our girls, Nicole Hozempa, who has gone on to be a Brownie leader herself.

Girls registered in our group during its operation included (in no particular order): Nicole Bechard, Shayla Vernon, Ellen Glaze, Darah Boesch, Angela Moats, Morgan Moats, Laura Zolc, Amber Zolc, Angela Wiebe, Marjorie Wiebe, Amy Ackerman, Trudy Picard, Jackie Picard, Alyson Ford, Tyler Wahl, Trudy Ellert, Janelle Lubkiwski, Courtney Bleau, Erin Schmeling, Breanna Schmeling, Lindsay Lewis, Laura Hunt, Darlyn Hunt, Nicole Hozempa, Sarah Daborn, Angela Bueche, Krystal Pederson and Jody Bohlken.

My most memorable events included planting the trees at the Gray School, our work with Operation Burrowing Owl, building bird houses in Dave Moat's shop, High Teas and Teddy Bear picnics and of course the many weekend camps over the years.

We dissolved the group in 1996.

Gray Update 1984-2005

The elevators have disappeared and the landscape of Gray is forever changed. The five elevators, which could be seen for miles, are no more.

Bill Carnegie continues to operate Gray Farm Equipment from his shop on 2nd Avenue. The General Store closed in the early 90's. The building was purchased in 1994 by Reid and Myrna Mossing and renovated into a childcare facility. The Gray Goose Day Care operated by Myrna often has 10-12 children registered at the facility. In 2002 the K.C. Gillis and Sons garage building was sold to Barry Frisk (for private use).

Gray School attendance has been strong. Enrollment the last several years has averaged 20-25 students. Pre-K was introduced in 2005. Amalgamation of school districts has occurred and Gray Consolidated School Division will cease to exist in 2006. We become part of a larger district and do not know the future of our school. The school grounds thrive due to a lot of volunteer enthusiasm. In the early 90's trees were planted around the school grounds and survived under the constant eye (and watering) of

Johnny Ford. The Home and School committee is very active and has raised funds (along with assistance from the Hamlet of Gray and the Gray School) to install new playground equipment (used by all the kids of Gray, not just the Gray school students). Flowers and shrubs were planted along the front of the building (initiated by Ginny Carpenter and with the guidance/assistance of Laurie Moats) that beautify the school yard. The metal Gray School sign was also a purchase of the Home and School committee.

Gray Memorial hall continues to be the location for community celebrations: anniversaries, bridal showers, community classes and fundraisers. The Hall has become an integral part of the Gray School curriculum. It provides a site for Phys Ed classes and school activities: everything from Jump Rope for Heart and other projects to the Annual Christmas concert.

Over the last twenty years Gray researched and provided some improvements to the resident services. In 1987 the Hamlet of Gray tasked Johnny Ford to investigate a new water source since the two dugouts were running low from lack of run-off. An aquifer was found several miles east of Gray. Peter Koch from Claybank was the contractor hired to lay 9 miles of 3" plastic pipe. By the end of the month the water was coming through to the hamlet pump house. George Dierker has become a certified water and sewer operator (since 1997). He has recently started to serve for the Riceton community as well.

The year of 2004 brought the closure of the landfill and the initiation of personal garbage pick-up. This system has been extremely well accepted – in fact, the best public response to a town project in years.

Memories of working in the Gray Telephone Office Lorna (Dunning) Hames - age 91 (submitted by Carol Bassingthwaite)

Although I can't remember the exact year, sometime in the mid-1930's the job for telephone operator was open and Mrs. Selig and I applied together. The salary was \$30/month...\$15 each!

The telephone office was a nice little square building with an entry porch on the side. Just inside was a counter with the switchboard behind. There was a little telephone booth that people could come in and use...they would say what number they wanted and we would ring it. In the back were our

living-quarters; we had a front room, a kitchen and a bedroom. Mrs. Selig had the bedroom and I bought a chesterfield that made into a bed that I put in the front room to sleep on. There was an outhouse in the back.

When someone wanted to make a phone call they would turn a crank on their phone which rang through to the switchboard. We answered by saying, "Number, please." We then put the matching plug into the number they wanted and turned a crank to ring that person's phone. When they answered we turned the sound off at the switchboard. The switchboard indicated when they hung up and we would pull out the plugs.

People who lived in town had private lines, but those in the country were on party lines, often 5 families for one line. Each family had their own ring (e.g. one long and one short) so whenever anyone got a call, everyone on the party line knew it.

We were also responsible for keeping track of the number and length of calls, and making out a ticket for headquarters. People paid by the month for local calls and by the length of time for long distance calls, just as we do now.

I think the switchboard was open from about 7AM until 9PM, although one or the other of us needed to be present 24 hours a day in case of emergencies. Mrs. Selig went to ladies' meetings in the afternoon so I would look after the switchboard then; she would take over in the evenings so I could go out. It worked out very well.

I remember in the evenings the farm people would come into town. The men gathered in Tom Ashbough's office (implement shed office) to talk. The young people would gather in cars and visit. One time Mrs. Selig was out at her daughter's for the evening, so I was responsible for listening for the switchboard. Even so, I joined the young people but we remained within hearing distance of the telephone office. The switchboard rang and I ran to answer it, thinking it might be an emergency. It turned out to be a fellow I had met at a dance, phoning to talk to me!

In order to supplement our income Mrs. Selig did dressmaking and I did hairdressing in our front room. Mrs. Selig was a good cook so she did most of our cooking. The kitchen had a coal/wood cook stove.

I quit the telephone office to go to Bermuda. A friend I knew from Estlin had been working there and sent such glowing reports that when she asked if I wanted my name put in, I said, "Yes." I was accepted to work as a waitress in a big American hotel, so that ended my time as a telephone operator.

Riceton/Bechard Homecoming 1984 (by Becky Kribs-Maloney written in 1984)

It was the year 1902 that Mr. and Mrs. James Rice came to homestead at SW ¼ 30-13-17 W2. In 1906, Mr. Rice donated the northeast portion of his quarter for a town site and shortly thereafter, the hamlet was named Riceton. The name made up of "Rice" from Mr. Rice and "ton" from another early pioneer by the name of Mr. Alonzo Johnston.

The first pioneers arrived in Milestone or Lang via the Soo Line with promised dreams of making their fortune on the vast, treeless, desolate prairies. It was not until the year 1912 that the Grand Trunk Pacific built a railroad which brought the first train to Riceton and which subsequently was the birth of the hamlet of Bechard, six miles southeast of Riceton on land which was originally owned and homesteaded by Mr. A. D. Bechard.

Both hamlets have survived scores of hardships, including two World Wars, drought, depression and the persistent battle with the uncontrollable elements of nature. Such was and still is the peremptory attitude of the prairie farmer; people simply do not give in to defeat.

It was the strength and determination of these pioneers which initially inspired a group of people from the original Buck Lake communities of Estlin, Gray, Riceton and Bechard to compile a mammoth book of histories entitled The Ties That Bind dedicated to the men and women who worked so hard to build a life for themselves which we still enjoy today. As the book was nearing its completion, it was decided that a Homecoming be planned for each town in order to reunite and honour all those who once lived and who still live there. This is the story of one of these celebrations.

For a year, the people of Riceton/Bechard worked on revolutionizing the shell of the new community centre which was to replace the one which was destroyed by fire in 1974. By the spring of 1984, the fundamental structure had been erected and a dance floor had been built. Typical of small town

budgets, the people had had to depend heavily upon their own creativity and ingenuity to transform a basic clay and plywood edifice into something very special. Visitors were obviously surprised to see the colourful array of banners, flags, bulrushes, signs and booths. The hall was put to its first test on the evening of Friday, July 13th when over eight hundred people from all over Canada, the United States and even from as far away as England, registered for the Homecoming weekend. That evening was set aside for coffee and reunions. Souvenir cups, plates, spoons, hats, T-shirts, wooden nickels (which, due to inflation, became bucks) all with a logo depicting the first train to come to Riceton were sold, as well as copies of The Ties That Bind.

Saturday, July 14th opened at 8AM with a superb pancake breakfast. On display was a unique quilt which had been made during the Second World War by the ladies of Riceton and Bechard who did knitting and sewing for the Red Cross. Each family was given a yellow square upon which to write and then embroider names of family members at a cost of 25¢ each. Tickets for a raffle were sold and the quilt was won by the late William and Ann Ferris. Years later it was donated back to the community by their son and daughter-in-law Fred and Thelma Ferris. It is hoped that this sentimental piece will be put on permanent display in the hall upon its completion.

Following the breakfast, the very first set of the two-volume The Ties That Bind to come off the press was unveiled, specially embossed and displayed in a velvet-lined box. Raffle tickets were sold and a draw was made following the Sunday church service and dinner. Mrs. Otto Bohlken won the raffle and is now in possession of this coveted copy.

At noon, happy chaos erupted when the six school districts reunited under the banners which had been created by the children of Riceton School. Former Cross, Richardson, Badger Hill, Knox, Riceton and Centre View students gathered together to sign their banners and to reminisce with old teachers and friends.

It is difficult to envision a parade passing through a town as tiny as Riceton, but, at 2PM people began to line the streets and soon we were provided with an intriguing display of horses, wagons, antique farm machinery and cars, the Regina Police Boys Junior Band, MP Len Gustafson of Assiniboia Constituency and, of course, Riceton's own local Co-op truck, Fire truck, school float, Pilgrim Lutheran Church float,

Riceton Seed Plant, Ne-De Systems, Larson Distributing and numerous other entries from the surrounding areas. The children decorated their bicycles and speeded by at the very end.

Next on the agenda was a fashion show which was obviously the product of a great deal of preparation and hard work. Approximately 30 families donated various outfits of clothing ranging from the year 1905 through to 1982. Riceton's 30-odd superb models, all of whom had had extensive training with Vogue in New York, were able to convey the feeling of each era. Some of the outfits brought a few chuckles from the audience as they remembered wearing things such as the 1917 Riceton ball uniform, matching black 1920's bathing suits; 1920's long johns and more recently, the ever unattractive 1970's "his and hers" plaids.

Approximately seven hundred people sat down to supper together, after that was staged the "official welcome". Wilber Moats, Chairman of the Historical Committee, was Master of Ceremonies and introduced Riceton's dry-humoured Harriet Kirkpatrick, known more affectionately to most simply as "grandma Hattie". There were very few dry eyes in the audience as Hattie finished her welcome home speech. Everyone felt as one, and as if they truly were loved as she was saying. In fact, her speech was so moving that the audience gave her a standing ovation, to which she retorted that she's "never heard of anyone getting a standing ovation for making a jackass of themselves".

Next to speak was Cecile Purves who read aloud a poem written by Mrs. Irene Kinvig in 1955 when Riceton celebrated Saskatchewan's fiftieth anniversary. Chairman of the Homecoming committee, Marge Larson, was next with a thank you to all those who helped to make the Homecoming a success. Gary Lane, Minister of Justice, was last to speak and offered his congratulations on behalf of the legislature. "Morning Rain" was the band that entertained at the dance following the speeches at 9:30PM.

At 11AM Sunday morning, an Interdenominational church service was held at the Gray Rink with guest clergy and a mass choir participating. It was a very moving and sensitive way to end a weekend of tribute to our forefathers. It was a weekend which saw the people of Riceton and Bechard join together in the spirit of community and create a memorable experience with ingenuity and self-reliance.

Riceton Blues Ladies Fastball Team (by Rochelle Balfour and Viola Glaze)

On July 12, 2003 a reunion of the Riceton Blues Ladies Fastball team was held at Gary and Anita Ford's home at B-Say-Tah on Echo Lake. This was 15 years after the team played its last game in the Soo Line Ladies Fastball League. The year was 1988 and we beat Avonlea to win the league.

The Riceton team was started in the spring of 1980. The team practiced in Riceton and played in the Sports Day that year. We lost to Gray 20 – 7, but we sure had fun! Our first coach was Donnie Moats and a few of the first team members were: Lorraine Moyse, Norma Banga, Eleanor Baker, Lenore Schmeling, Danelle Kirkpatrick, Phyllis Walter, Suanne McCracken, Viola (Hall) Glaze and Rochelle Balfour.

In 1981 and 1982, our confidence grew. We participated in Sports days in Gray, Estlin and Yellow Grass. Whether it was a Sports Day or a regular game, there was always good fan support from townspeople, parents and grandparents. There was also an abundance of kids, for many of the players had children. Husbands were called upon to handle things at home or during games. It was a great time. Other coaches that helped the team were Don Zolc, Cliff Hubick and Randy Miller.

The Riceton Blues joined the Soo Line Fastball League in 1983. The league consisted of Milestone, Rouleau, Drinkwater, Pense, Avonlea and Riceton. That year, we lost the semifinal game to Rouleau 20 – 9. We were still perfecting our game!!

In 1984 a few players from Gray joined the team. They included Anita, Atina and Cindy Ford, Val

Wahl, Bev Wahl, and Rhonda McDonald. Gary Ford and Bob Balfour started coaching the team. At our first meeting, we were all at the ball diamond in Riceton. Gary mentioned that we should really give up the name of the Riceton Rejects, if we wanted others to take us seriously. Our name was changed to the Riceton Blues and we all agreed that new uniforms were in order. Pense was our biggest rival that year. We lost to them both in the final at the Riceton Sports Day and in the league semifinal. The score was 2 - 1.

Whenever Gary saw someone get too feisty, he would yell, "Don't get mad, get better!" The next year, 1985, we did just that. We were in the playoffs against Pense, in a best of three series. We won the third and final game in Riceton and our first league championship. Gary and Anita surprised us with cold champagne to celebrate our victory.

In 1986, we lost in the playoff to Rouleau. We won the first game 12 – 10, but the second game was a loss 19 – 18. Not only did we lose this high scoring game, Anita tore her knee when she attempted to steal home. She ended up wearing a brace from her upper thigh to her ankle. We lost the last game, ending the season.

Every July 1st weekend had us at the Avonlea Sports Day. Avonlea was always one of our biggest rivals over the years. With kids and husbands along, some people camped, and we all picnicked together. We were one big, happy family and everyone enjoyed each other's company.

Each year we would, of course, have a ball wind-up that different people hosted. The most memorable was at Gary and Anita's in Gray. The team rented a hot tub. Everyone brought food and drink and Anita prepared her famous baked beans. Of course, Gary was always teased about going in the hot tub. His answer would be that he hadn't gone to Tent and Awning for a bathing suit. These were wonderful events we shared.

The highlights and memories of these years are very special. We would usually carpool to our away games. These were always great fun. We would meet at the ball diamond in Riceton, pile into whosever vehicle, and off we would go. The Gray people did the same. Sometimes after a game, a local establishment might be found to celebrate a win or pore over a loss. The trip home was usually

a little quieter, but full of discussions on what happened that evening.

The last two years we played, 1987 and 1988, we won the league. Both finals were against Avonlea. With depopulation of the countryside and some of the players having more children, we no longer had enough players for a team. The problem was the same for the other towns, and the league folded.

We would like to list, to the best of our memories, the names of the players who were Riceton Blues over the years; Erin Balfour, Rochelle Balfour, Norma Banga, Brenda Collacott, Roseann Debruyne, Anita Ford, Atina Ford, Cindy Ford, Viola Glaze, Danelle Kirkpatrick, Rhonda McDonald, Sueanne McCracken, Shirley Miller, June Mitchell, Sylvia Oyka, Sharon Palmer, Lana Purves, Leah Purves, Lenore Schmeling, Bev Wahl, Val Wahl, Monica Wallace, Phyllis Walter, Loretta Webb, Betty Whiteman, Jo-anne Zolc.

The reunion in 2003 was paid for by a small, but substantial bank account and gave us enough for one last great party. The money was earned from selling hundreds of rice crispy cakes, plus fifteen years of interest. As the sun was setting over B-Say-Tah we had a friendly game of ball. The Riceton Blues were once again victorious, beating the men by one run. We won't mention that the men had to hit the ball on their opposite side. We were happy to leave without the aid of an ambulance.

My apologies to anyone I've missed. Thanks for the memories everyone. We miss you Gary!!

Riceton Ladies Committee (by Penny Wiebe)

The Riceton Ladies Committee was formed in the 1950's and continues to function today. This group of volunteers, numbering between 5 and 8 women, has provided a wide variety of services to the community over the years. Initially, one of their major commitments was to organize, prepare and serve meals at the local curling bonspiels in the days when Riceton still had a rink. At the Annual Sports Day, the Ladies Committee has run the refreshment booth at the ball diamond nearly every year. They have also organized Bridal Showers for local brides, parties for people leaving the community, served luncheons at funerals, birthdays and anniversaries.

In recent years they have hosted a Kite Flying Day, "Ladies' Nights Out", quilting classes, and "Mosaic

Meals". Some of their efforts are specifically intended to raise funds for the operations of the Recreation Centre, providing money for improvements such as a Wheelchair Accessible Bathroom.

Riceton United Church (by Deena Jones)

This is the story of the closing of the Riceton United Church of Canada. There were two special services held there since 1984; one in 1985 and one in 1996.

In 1985 we celebrated a 60th anniversary. A service was held with congregations from Estlin, Gray and Riceton in attendance. Sharon Davis was our minister. Lunch was served on the Riceton ball diamond. At that time, summer services were held in the church building and winter services were held in Hattie Kirkpatrick's home.

In June of 1996, with lots of help from the community, the final service was held, celebrating 75 years since the church was built. The officiating ministers were Reverend Howard Hanson, Reverend John Haas, and Reverend Margaret Harper. The choir was the "Singing Friends and Neighbours" group. Many past members attended, about 200, with a real celebration of our church's history. Strawberries and angel food cake followed in the Riceton Community Centre after a severe rainstorm.

The church Trustees; Alice Keen, Lee Moats and Bruce Jones began looking into the sale of the building and lots 1 and 2 Block 9 Plan No. BC887.

After a couple of false starts it was sold to Wayne Daly and Teandra Manchur. The few members had their memberships transferred to the Gray United Church.

The pews as well as the piano and smaller items were sold to various people. One of the pews is in the Riceton Community Centre with a plaque engraved with the names of all the ministers that have served the church since its' opening in 1921. Money left in the Credit Union was transferred to the Gray Church that continues on with members from Estlin, Gray and Riceton.

Riceton Volunteer Fire Department (by Lee Moats and Gord Glaze)

The Riceton Volunteer Fire Brigade (RVFB) was formed thirty years ago, in March of 1975, as a non-incorporated, not for profit membership association to provide fire protection services to the communities of Riceton, Gray, Estlin and surrounding rural areas. The RVFB was wholly funded by memberships purchased for \$100.00 for five years. Initial fire fighting equipment was very modest, consisting of a portable fire pump and associated equipment. A truck, building and additional equipment were added as the Brigade could afford them and by the year 2000 equipment consisted of a pumper truck, ladders, hose, self-contained breathing apparatus, portable pump, modern fire suits, generator, and lights. During this time the Brigade began receiving funding from the R.M. of Lajord that was and continues to be generated by a special fire levy.

The new millennium brought major improvements to the RVFB, with a new fire hall constructed on the site of our original hall in the summer of 2000. The

RVFB membership was incorporated in March 2003 and renamed the Riceton Volunteer Fire Department (RVFD). At this time memberships (currently 97 paid members) were increased to \$150 for five years. With direction taken from the incorporation meeting, the directors sought out and purchased a second fire truck, which was delivered in August 2003. Additional hose, tools and equipment were purchased to outfit the new truck in the fall/winter of 2003-04. In 2005, three handheld two-way radios were purchased, greatly improving our communications.

The RVFD is governed by a 10 member Board of Directors. Those Directors, as of March 2005, are Gord Glaze (President), Neal Moyse (Fire Chief), Todd Lewis, Bob Balfour, Rob Pitchko, Don Moats, Brett Moyse, Rob Wozney, Jeff Coleclough and Lee Moats (Secretary/Treasurer). Active fire fighters include those above and Scott Moyse, Terry Baker, Randy Frei, KaCee Maloney, Howard Wiebe, Mark Goliay, Blayne Ulrich and Wade Ulrich. Two original active fire fighters from 1975 remain involved in the department: Neal Moyse and Don Moats. RVFD would also like to thank individuals too numerous to mention, who help out at fires, manning pumps, running for supplies, hauling water and providing food, water and coffee.

The Riceton Volunteer Fire Department is very grateful for the financial support provided by members, the R.M. of Lajord, the hamlets of Riceton and Gray and numerous local businesses and individuals who have all contributed to the success of the Department. Over the last 30 years the Fire Department has benefited from the experience and hard work of many people. Many volunteer firefighters have come and gone over the years and we thank them as well as our current volunteers for their contributions. Several key members of the original Brigade have passed away over the years. In particular the Department would like to recognize the contributions of Dan Kirkpatrick and George Spry who along with Neal Moyse were fundamental to its creation and operation.

Singing Friends & Neighbours (by Pat Myers)

Although our group is not a hundred years old like our province, we have been entertaining for twenty-two years. We officially got our name in 1983 under the direction of Sharon Davis who was the United Church Minister of Estlin, Gray and Riceton.

Until then we had been singing as a group for various community functions, as well as church services. It was decided that since a lot of practice went into our preparation of these songs we should sing them more than just once. Thus we took our “act” on the road performing mostly at Senior Citizen homes. We enjoyed it so much we’re still at it! Over the years members have come and gone, our pianist has been replaced by a keyboard named “Molly” and our director is Marilyn Hill – but the underlying love of music and wanting to share it has not changed; we have developed friendships and a respect for each other that is enduring and above all we have fun! Currently we have fourteen members. We are from the communities of Estlin, Gray, Kronau, Lajord, Lumsden and Regina. We practice at Sharon Frei’s in Regina every Monday night. It doesn’t seem to matter how cold it is or how icy the roads are – we’re there. By April we are more or less ready to perform. We try to do the majority of our singing in April and May before seeding gets started. A lot of our members are still on the farm and needed; although we will sing any time we are asked if at all possible!

So, please, come hear us sing!

The Little School That Could pg 336-345 (by Kim E. Engel)

Gray School is a place where the impossible is always possible - and probable. In my 12 years as principal and teacher, for 9 of those years the only teacher, I learned as much as I taught. During my first week at the school in the fall of 1989, I had visits from many residents of the community who came by to chat, offer their words of wisdom, and more importantly the offer of help if I ever needed it.

Over the years help was regularly offered, whether I thought I needed it or not, I guess that’s part of the learning as much as I taught! If the lights were on a little too late, I’d receive calls from concerned neighbours like Donna Ford (who would inevitably bring me supper and then tell me to go home). Or a friendly phone call, like Greg Kelly (chairman of the board) asking me to go home because he was tired of fielding calls from other concerned residents!

In the winter, Rob Daborn, would regularly help me with a car that wouldn’t start (reminding me that there was a plug in the light post and I should use it!). John Hozempa would let me know if the roads were safe to pass before I headed out on blustery

mornings. The expression became, “If John isn’t going, than no one’s going!”

Dave Moats would drop by and build anything for me that my imagination came up with. And I’ve always had a little too good of an imagination! He would create amazing wood working pieces and quietly drop them off in his humble way.

In my 12 years at Gray, we had two deaths that touched very close to our school, Rich Collacott and Guy Yeo. Though both were a time of extreme grief, they were also a time that the community of Gray shone as it supported the families of those men through acts of kindness and love. I have lived, studied and worked all over this country; but I had never seen such a continual concern for well-being, I certainly saw it when Gray stood with these families.

John Ford would come by a few times a week to help in any way he could, or just put a smile on my face. He got us involved in planting the trees around the perimeter of the schoolyard, and then faithfully watered them. He was our “Neighbourhood Watch”, always keeping an eye out for anything that wasn’t quite right. His wise eyes and words were always appreciated. I knew we could always count on John; he was a grandpa to all of the student body. He was also at every annual meeting of the school board, even if he was the only one!

The students of Gray School have certainly given me enough material to write several books! They have always been hard working, fun loving people. To say that the dynamics of such a school are unique is probably a gross understatement. When I started I had 12 students in grade 1-6; when I left we had 26 students in K – Grade 6. These kids learn at an early age to work together and to appreciate the strengths of each person. They were a joy to teach. One grade one student in my first year at Gray commented that he thought I had the best job in the world, when I asked him why, he replied “You get to play with us all day, and they pay you!” A school reflects its community, and more often that not, the reflection was lovely.

I was always amazed by the support given to different initiatives that we put forward to enhance the student’s education. I always taught about democracy and elections by simulating elections with all of the students. One year we were in the

midst of a Gray School Federal Election, with three determined candidates. In the preparation stages for the election, a parent called to say she'd like to help. So as a result, Cindy Bechard became our Governor General and we all went to her house as Renee Muir (Jean Chrétien) dropped the writ. The excitement was extraordinary and catchy. As the weeks went by, more and more parents wanted to get involved – coming out to our debates; assisting our electoral officer; counting ballots ... the message those simple acts gave our students was that when you are part of a community, you get involved and help where you can.

These are all people and times I will fondly remember about Gray, the impossible is possible because it is a community that doesn't give up.

In 1984, our mom, Mary Aitken, was living at Mary Helen Herchmer Place, a home she enjoyed for 13 years. She took an active part in the activities there and made many friends. In March 1996, due to failing health, she bravely and graciously moved to Santa Maria Citizens Home, where she lived for 8 years. Caregivers spoke of her as a “special lady with a beautiful smile and always a thank you”. Courage, determination and faith were some of her many strengths. Mom had a sharp mind and a remarkable memory that we all depended on.

Mom’s greatest joy was her family. She was a devoted, loving mother, grandmother, great and great-great-grandmother. Ashford, Bennett pg 387

I graduated from Gray High School in 1942. I attended with a most distinguished group; Dorothy (Hendrickson) Burwell, Lois (Hendrickson) Byce, Rhoda Pomeroy, Ann Marko, and Jack Muller.

WWII had started in 1939 for Canada. I was registered for the Canadian military draft and also the U.S. draft when I was a freshman at the University of North Dakota, at age 17, taking Civil Engineering and in the Reserved Officer Training. As a civilian I worked helping expand the airport at Grand Forks, ND. When I reached 18, I was notified by both Canada and the U.S. to report for military duty. I chose to volunteer for the U.S. Air Force to be a pilot. As it happened, the casualty rate for pilots was low enough there was an ample supply of people for such assignment, but there were lots of openings as a Private in the U.S. Army, and I filled one of those openings.

My combat experience was in a machine gun squad in the last battle of WWII on the island of Okinawa. The battle started on Easter Sunday, April 1, 1945 and ended June 20, 1945, when most Japanese soldiers had killed themselves and the rest

surrendered. I am so lucky, my burns from hot shell fragments have healed long ago, and there is just a constant irritating buzz in my right ear from a mortar explosion. Both injuries were from friendly fire (my own people). Lots of goofy things happen when you turn a bunch of teenagers loose in someone else's country, with all the ammunition and weapons imaginable. Statistics don't tell the whole story; but in 90 days the U.S. had 11,000 ground forces killed, 110,000 Japanese troops killed, and 145,000 Okinawa civilians killed, thousands more wounded and maimed, caught in the crossfire. Those poor folks are still stuck with U.S. forces on their island.

I'll relate three events that still recur in memory about my infantry machine gun squad.

A typical evening procedure was to set our machine guns to cover any Japanese movement during the night and we would fire up flares to light the area if needed. One night it was my turn on the gun and a bunch of Japanese attacked our position, firing a light machine gun with bullets hitting just below me; kicking up dirt and filling my eyes with dirt. I'd duck; wipe out my eyes, get my head up and ready to return fire, and the same thing would happen. The Japs were moving up the hill only 30 feet or so

below me, and my guys were yelling for me to fire back. They were all in foxholes around me, with rifles. This was the only time I ever heard the yell "Bonzai". Our sound powered phone was buzzing. I was pulling pins and rolling grenades down hill trying to fire the gun and answer the phone. After it quieted down, I answered the Company Commander on the phone. "If you want to know what is happening up here, climb out of that hole you're hiding in, and hike that two miles forward, and take a look." He never came up to look. He wasn't that curious.

The second event, we had the gun set to cover an open field where we felt people might try to move. I was asleep right next to the gun, and all of a sudden the machine gun firing woke me. The guy on the gun emptied the box of 250 rounds when a flare went up and a line of 13 people was walking past. I feel sure they were all killed, none escaped. They all fell right in order as they walked. There were 13 dead bodies, a line of Japanese soldiers, and two young girls with their arms around each other; and one soldier behind them, herding them along. At the time, I just felt justified that the girls were girlfriends of the Japanese; but years later I'm now convinced those young women (maybe 15-25 years old) were Korean "Comfort Girls". The Japs held them captive as sex slaves, and brought them from Korea.

Well, my last story is about June 22, 1945. The word was spread the Japanese were surrendering on Okinawa. Their Commander had committed Hari Kari, and the Okinawan civilians had been told by the Japs to surrender to U.S. soldiers, and expect to be killed by the U.S. soldiers. The sight was amazing. The Okinawan civilians started coming out of caves that were hidden, and we had not noticed, they were so well camouflaged. They were walking up past us, and taken by our M.P.'s to barbed wire pens. Most were women and children, carrying pieces of white cloth to show surrender. I'm sure those little kids expected to be killed, they were so brainwashed. There were still a few cases where some of the people surrendering would get close and explode a grenade, so we had the men all strip before they got close.

Life is bright now. At 80 years of age I have a great wife and family and only the irritation of constant buzzing in my right ear, as the price for my Combat Infantry Badge, Bronze Star, and Purple Heart

medals. My wife says my hearing complaints are just when she asks me to take out the garbage.

Gray was and is a great place. God is good, and plan another reunion in 50 years.

I'd like to put on skates and play a little hockey. My wife says Ha, Ha, Ha.

I retired in 1986, two years after The Ties That Bind was published. We traveled a bit, planning to be very active in retirement; and we have been but Patty, my bride of 52 years, suffered a stroke in 1990 that placed some limitations on us. But, as those relatives that we still have in Canada can attest, we got back to Gray and Regina several times and may again. But in 2003 a number of our Canadian relatives and friends, including Dawn (Husband) Bender, Dale (Husband) Yeo and Tom Hannan came to Virginia to help us celebrate our 50th wedding anniversary. Dawn and Dale brought a number of children and grandchildren as well. My brother Bennet, his wife Neva and a number of their children and grandchildren came from the west coast. I believe they all came in awe that anyone would put up with me for so many years.

Jean passed away in October 1994 of cancer and Fred passed away in September 1996 of a heart attack. Fred was fortunate to have traveled to see all

his family within a month of his death. Their next-door neighbours in Regina, Dean and Shirley Boesch, were very helpful during the last few years.

Don and Joan retained the E1/2 30-13-18 which is leased to Dale and Kathy Henry. The family home was demolished in 2003 leaving a barn and a few steel bins.

Balfour, Bob and Rochelle (Gibeau) pg 868

My mother and father, Laura and Paul Gibeau, lived on the farm at Bechard since 1945. My dad passed away September 1976. My husband Bob and I, moved from Regina to take over the farm and help my mother.

Bob was born in Mossbank, SK but from the age of 10 had lived in Regina. We met in high school and were married April 1971. He graduated from the University of Regina, with an education degree in Physical Education, in 1975. He was teaching at Sheldon-Williams high school at the time my dad passed away. With the help of his dad, Robert Balfour Sr., Bob stepped in and began his farming career. He basically taught himself about farming and took classes in welding and motor mechanics. Mom moved to Regina in the fall of 1977.

Our first child, **Erin** was born in January 1978. Our second daughter, **Jennifer** was born in May 1979. Little Grandma, as her granddaughters called her, visited and babysat often. It was on one of her trips back to the city, that she was killed in a car accident. It was August 1984.

Growing up, the girls attended playschool in Riceton, run by Phyllis Walter. Kindergarten and grade 1 to 6 were also in Riceton. Some of their teachers included Mary-Jo Steve and June Mitchell, along with teacher-aide Judy Zolc. Both girls, at an early age, learnt to skate on the farm dugout and later with the Gray Figure Skating Club. Erin, at age seven, played hockey with the Gray Ghosts. And she still plays hockey to this day.

Bob could also be found playing hockey with the Gray Blades and Screaming O's and any other team who needed a player. I also curled in Gray in the winter. Bob played ball with both Riceton and Gray, and I played with the Riceton Blues Ladies fastball team. Bob was also a school bus driver when needed, and was Chairman of the Riceton School Board for 10 years.

In 1988, we made the decision to farm organically. We have been certified organic for 15 years.

A very difficult decision was made in 1989. The family moved its residence to Sedley. The girls attended Francis and Sedley schools, graduating in 1996 and 1997.

Bob and I moved back to the farm in December of 1999. Erin graduated from the University of Regina with a Bachelor of Kinesiology, Sports Administration degree. I was born to Arthur and Margaret Bonsor on February 16, 1937 the youngest of two boys and two girls. I have fond memories of skating, curling, dances at Gray, church picnics, going out with friends, and I could go on and on. I completed my grade 12 at Estlin and then attended Success Business College in Regina for a year where I obtained a Stenographers Certificate in June 1957. I worked at the Medical Arts Clinic in Regina for a total of five and a half years. In June of 1959 I traveled by myself to Rainbow, CA to visit my aunt and uncle. Rainbow is halfway between Los Angeles and San Diego. I went down by train and flew back. They took me to the San Diego Zoo, to Tijuana, Mexico, to La Jolla to pick seashells on the beach, and to Oceanside to swim in the ocean. I did not get to see Disneyland as my aunt said it was just

for children which was quite true at that time. In 1960 I went with my parents by bus to Amherstberg and St. Catherines, ON to visit relatives. We also saw Niagara Falls and the Welland Canal.

I met Sebastian McLeod in about 1957 as my sister (Margaret) and his sister (Betty) lived on the same block of King Street in Regina. Following the 1984 Homecoming, great satisfaction and elation was felt by the Estlin homecoming committee of which I had the pleasure of being a part, along with our chairperson Josie Black, secretary treasurer Elaine East, Arlene Phillips, Dorothy Gooding, and Carl Webster. Several of our young people expressed their sincere thanks along with the hope, that in a few years, we would plan to come together once again to celebrate our common roots and history. The Saskatchewan Centennial celebrations would seem to be the perfect opportunity.

For many of us, the homecoming event had proved to be much more than just a huge party and reunion. Suddenly, the combined family and community histories, and the countless personal stories came alive for us through the displays of photos, antiques, artifacts and our priceless history book, The Ties That Bind. A more fitting title could not have been found.

I don't believe many of us were fully prepared for the tremendous impact the meeting of distant relatives, old friends and former school chums would have. Shared memories, both good and bad, came flooding back and took on a whole new significance. The most poignant event for me was the gathering together of all the former Estlin United Church Junior Choir members. Saturday afternoon we practiced and Sunday we were to lead the music in a big tent church service. Once again we were under the direction of Beryl Clarke, who at that time was residing in White Rock, BC. She had sent early copies of the chosen anthems to those she remembered could sing the harmonies. The singers poured into the little church amidst hugs, jokes and wild raucous laughter. We were home! On Sunday we sang with joy and very full hearts. As children we never dreamed what a strong influence participating in this small rural church choir would have on our lives. Many had pursued some form of musical education and shared their talents wherever they went. Others continued to provide leadership and entertainment in their own, and in neighbouring communities. Personally, I've had the great pleasure and honour of sharing the joy, and sometimes the sorrow, at many Estlin and Gray families' weddings, christenings, anniversaries and funerals.

(Burwell) Schwanbeck, Gaye and Ron pg 421

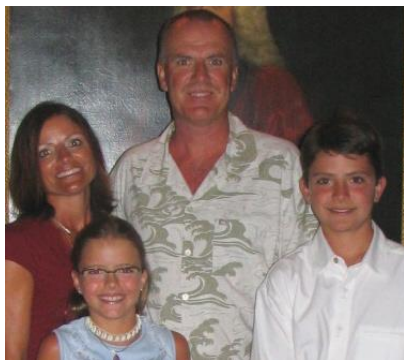
Gaye and Ron continue living in Saskatoon.

23 years ago Estlin, Gray, Riceton and Bechard were planning a homecoming celebration. I was expected to be there, sing in the choir and meet old friends and write about the family in The Ties That Bind. I expected this to be a boring dumb event and reluctantly arrived to endure the occasion. I certainly wasn't going to write anything for 'the book'.

From the moment it began I was overwhelmed with excitement, memories and the exhilaration of renewing old friendships and building new ones. The "history books" are researched on a regular basis with family and friends to seek information or settle arguments, to confirm dates and events or be excited about stories from the past.

When the communities decided to hold their celebrations of the provinces 100th anniversary and update "The Book" I felt like I had a second chance to be a part of this special moment in history. These

are the stories that come to mind to share about growing up on the farm, our communities, and living amongst all of you.

Childhood - My first memories are of a one and a half storey stucco house with sloped ceilings in the bedrooms upstairs, a hand pump for water, and a bucket for a toilet that you had to haul to empty. There was a combination wood and kerosene stove and kerosene refrigerator. There were cows for milking. The cream was stored in crocks in the fridge which were emptied into cream cans which Dad and I hauled to town (Regina) and sold to the dairy for them to make into butter.

There were family picnics, BBQs and community events and while I don't remember their names, I do remember being in awe and reverence of the grand old white haired ladies and gentlemen. These were our ancestors, a role into which it seems that I am now evolving.

In 1949 the friends and neighbors helped build a new home for the Clarke family (and many other families in our community). My brothers and I watched wide-eyed in awe and amazement, as tractors pulled demolished chunks of concrete and house out of the old basement. A new home rose floor by floor out of this hole. The men dug by hand a 20,000 gallon cistern with 12 inch goose-necked spades. It seemed like it was a tunnel to China. The dirt was hoisted out of the abyss in 45 gallon drums with ropes and winches hung from a teepee tripod over the cavern.

My father made a movie by climbing regularly up the wind charger to film this home raising. Mom made meals and refreshments to feed the crew as the kitchen moved to the bunk house, then to the

basement before it finally re-established itself back in the “kitchen”. Neighbors and friends still tell stories about the house raising. I remember the laughter when one of the slowpokes discovered that his shoe had been nailed to the roof.

School Days - My first day of school came in the middle of winter after the teacher, Miss Joy Beach, approached my Mom and Dad, and Orval and Dorothy Lewis to have their son Kenneth and daughter Beth Lewis join the grade one class, otherwise there would only be the two of us starting school next year.

Thus began the bonding of Beth, Ken and the Dunbar twins, Kathy and Doreen, as we went all the way through school together with no one in the grade behind us. We always wanted to keep up to the classes ahead of us with our older brothers, sisters and friends.

Our female cousins and the girls at school were our sisters as we were a family of four boys. They nurtured and guided us into our early teens. They could beat us at arm wrestling, at baseball, running and jumping. They were so strong.

The older boys, I remember the Kennedys, Crosses, Bonsor, Elsaesser and Zimmerman helped teach and raise us. They were assigned as “Big Brothers” and mentors for the young ones. We would read to them and they would help us study. We certainly paid attention and did what we were told as they seemed so big and scary. Some of these family names are no longer in the community just memories of our past.

Yes, it is true that every rural school pupil had to walk to school barefoot in the cold blowing snow 10 miles to and 10 miles back home! Only in this case

it was riding our bikes to school against the wind, 2 miles west in the morning with the wind blowing directly in our faces. All day long we’d be excited anticipating the prospect of being able to ride home with that great tail wind, only to discover the wind had shifted and was still blowing in our faces for the bike ride home!

On occasion there was a special treat, riding our horse Bud, to school. It seemed that both horse and rider arrived exhausted from the constant urging and prodding to get the horse to school. The horses would spend all day in the school’s barn waiting to take us home. That ride was always a treat as the horse knew he was heading home for the barn. We got there lickety split!

It was during the school field and sports days and the community bonspiels and winter festivals that we met the kids from our neighboring towns down the CN Rail line; Gray, Riceton, Bechard and Lewvan. The words from our school chant still ring in my ears:

*“Purple and Gold,
Purple and Gold,
Those are the colors that make us so bold
If against us you compete
Well we’re sure that you’ll get beat
Boyle School, Boyle School, eat ‘em all up!!!”*

These years continued until the end of grade 10, when I had to leave Estlin School because they no longer taught grades 11 and 12, (indeed this was the beginning of the end of a school at Estlin). My grades 11 and 12 were completed at Sheldon-Williams Collegiate in Regina, living with my Grandma Johnstone at 2827 Regina Avenue.

But that’s the beginning of another story.

The Farm - Those years growing up at the farm were and still are spectacular. At the time we knew no other life except living, playing and growing up in the country. Afterwards when we had experienced another life, going to Regina for high school, Saskatoon and Minneapolis for University, and a work career across Canada and in the U.S., it simply reinforced how special and unique growing up at the farm really was.

The first time that I got to drive the tractor and disc alone in the field, I was probably 8 years old. Today’s parents would be horrified at the prospect.

To a young farm boy it was total exhilaration listening to the hum of the tractor, smelling the moist fallowed soil, feeling the emotions of a boy sensing the pride and confidence of his father.

That day ended with a tug-of-war amongst the parents and the boy. Mom thinking the farm boy should come in as it was getting dark and it had been a long day. The boy cried because he wanted to finish the field. The father understood and supported that it was now the time for the farm boy to finish the field, to have that satisfaction and fulfillment of completing a day's work well done.

It is often said that I inherited my dad's love for the land. I don't know for sure if you can inherit such things, but it is true that I do love the land. In my younger years into early teens there was the pride of learning how to operate Dad's brand new 1947, 44e Massey Harris tractor, whether it was pulling the Massey 15 ft. discer seeding, the 45 ft harrows and packers and one-way disc which Dad had made in the 1940's, the 15 ft John Deere swather or the ultimate experience of operating the old Holt (Caterpillar) combine, which Grandpa had bought back in 1927.

I was probably the last operator of a Holt combine in the community which we continued to use until 1974. This was a compliment and reflection of the maintenance artistry and skills which my father possessed. What a treat it was to be able to grow up in an era when the farmers designed, built, operated and maintained all of their own equipment. Unfortunately this was a gift and skill which I did not inherit. We still have the 44 Massey and it is being restored, this time to transport grandchildren or to run in the next parade.

Friends and family worked closely together in those days helping one another. There was the *Clarke Brothers and Cleveland* cooperative with my Dad Russell, Uncle Wallace Clarke and Uncle Wright Cleveland (married to my aunt Marian who was also a Clarke). All the machinery, aunts, uncles and cousins worked together as we attacked and conquered each field one after the other.

I will always remember the meals that were prepared and served in the field. The food tasted so good and it felt comforting as the farming operations paused and the families joined together to eat out in the open prairie.

One day my Grandpa Clarke (James William) came to the farm to hoe the weeds around the telephone poles, as was his ritual. He was dressed in his grey fedora hat, white long sleeve dress shirt buttoned up to the collar, wearing his open vest and carrying a quart sealer full of water for the day's work. Grandpa Clarke was a man of few words particularly around the grandchildren and younger generations.

On this day I was rod-weeding adjacent to where Grandpa Clarke was working. One round as I approached where he was hoeing, I saw him walking across the field toward me. As he arrived at the tractor I stopped and he climbed up and sat down on the fender beside me. Even though no words were spoken I knew I was to carry on.

As we made the trek diagonally across the field away from the road, I became aware of his large arm reaching slowly over my head and shoulders and a hand grasped the tractor steering wheel. Like a miracle the winding rows of the rod-weeding became straight. We turned and followed the straight line back to where Grandpa had been working. I stopped the tractor and he dismounted and continued his hoeing. At that moment I understood that farmers were supposed to drive in straight lines.

To this day I still check out the fields as you drive by to see if the rows are straight. You can tell how good a farmer he is and if he takes pride in his work by how straight the rows are in his fields!

Being able to work side by side with your dad and feeling the joy and contentment which that experience brings remains with you always. It was also quite a compliment to be "hired" by Uncle Wallace and Uncle Wright to cultivate their fields or drive their truck during harvest.

Even though we got paid a dollar an hour or ten dollars a day, which seemed like a lot of money at the time, the real reward was to be asked and to have the opportunity to help your family farm.

Who can forget the early 1950's when there was so much snow and it blew so hard that as kids we could climb from the snow drifts onto the roofs of the sheds and granaries. We made snow forts and dug tunnels that would go forever beneath the hard packed snow. In the spring and summer that followed, water was everywhere. It was up to the

neck of a young farm boy as everyone went swimming in the ditches and sloughs which became our new found lakes. Uncle Wright built a red boat for my cousins Glen and Dale and Dad built us “Blue Buoy” so we could all paddle or motor on these waterways.

The only way to get to school in the mud and rain was by horse or tractor. Talk about today’s “Snow Days”, we all prayed for more rain so we wouldn’t have to go to school. What a sight to see the Dewey Dunbar girls, all five of them, hanging off their Cockshut tractor as they ploughed their way to school in the mud and water. Dad built a trailer covered with a peak roof made out of a canvas tarpaulin, which he pulled behind the Massey 44. We delivered and picked up kids to and from school during those rainy summer school days.

After school Mom made us practice our music lessons for half an hour before we could go outside and play. It seemed like such cruel punishment at the time! Later our house would be filled with music and laughter as the girls from the community came to take singing lessons from my mom. These ladies still talk about how that experience changed their lives as they learned to appreciate music and to enjoy it to this day.

Roy Black also came for lessons, sent by his mother who heard him singing out in the fields on the tractor and knew he had a voice. “Roy could have sung in the movies and been a professional” everyone says.

There was an experience one day which shaped the course of my life. I remember it like it was yesterday.

The sky was clear and blue. The soil was warm and moist beneath my bare feet. The task that day was taking down the pasture fence. Dad had taught me how to roll the barbed wire to get as few pricks from the barbs as possible. To remove the fence posts I had been shown the trick of fastening a chain to the bottom of the post, rolling it over the circumference of a large abandoned steel combine wheel and fastening the chain to the back of the Massey 44. It was amazing how quick and easy those fence posts came out when the tractor moved forward and pulled the chain rolling it over the wheel. The pasture was turned into grain fields and the sense of accomplishment, joy and contentment was overwhelming.

As I looked to the horizons that surrounded the farm that day, I began to wonder, what was out there? That day I knew my roots would always be on the farm. That day there was also a stirring inside. There was an anticipation of adventures beyond the horizon that one day I would pursue.

I moved into Regina to attend high school and lived with Grandma Johnstone. One image about Grandma remains clear in my mind. Mom and Dad would always pick her up and bring her to the farm, she so loved to drive in the country. This summer Glenis and I visited my Mom in her new condo in Edmonton. When we arrived my mom announced that we were going to take her for a real drive in the country. She had just given up her car and no longer drives herself. We did drive her into the country and it reminded me of those days many summers before.

When I moved to Regina in 1959 this began the adventures off the farm of which I had dreamt earlier. While that is a story for another telling, the dates and events of that journey are chronicled below:

Throughout high school, university and my working career I continued operating and developing the farm. This was only possible of course with the support and help of my father until he died in 1982, our family and friends in the community. We called it our "Russian Co-operative", the family rushed and co-operated on weekends and holidays.

During high school and university I rented "the Champ" farm south 1/2 of section 18-15, using Dad's machinery and helping him run the family farm. In the 1970's I bought a half section from Wylie LaFoy two miles east of Gray across the road from where Grandma Clarke (Alice Beattie) grew up, and commuted with our machinery from Estlin to farm my first owned land. In 1979 I bought Mom and Dad's farm Section 7-15 at Estlin, establishing what is still the base for our farming operation today, as Mom and Dad phased into retirement.

In the 1980's I rented Wallace Clarke's farm, the other adjacent diagonal section 17-15 which Grandpa

Clarke had bought back in 1905. Today we continue to rent the land from his son, my cousin, Wayne Clarke. In the 1990's I purchased the "Babcock 1/4" NE of 6-15 adjacent to our "big slough" SE of 7. In the 2000's we also started farming the old "Jefferson" quarter, SE of 12-19. Today, we also rent the NE 12-19 and the S 1/2 13-19 from my cousins Don, Doug and Pat, and Aunt Millie and Uncle John from their Myers' farms across the road. Josie Black also asked us to farm for a few years, her NW 1/4 6-15, just south of the Clarke farm, and this was a special privilege.

The Community and Friends - Farming over these past five decades has demonstrated the true value and spirit of community friendship. Morley and Leeta Gooding are one of the cornerstones of the Estlin community. When Morley Gooding comes over to help you unplug your sewer system which is backing up into the basement at 3 a.m. in the morning, this defines the true meaning of friendship.

Roy Black would always stop to help if you were having problems in the field, I remember him stopping one day when I was a teenager trying to adjust the swather.

Aunt Doris (Myers) taught me how to “pump” the water suction hose to prime it when filling our cisterns or tanks with water from the dugouts. It seems like it was always cold and raining or snowing when we ran out of water.

Everyone in the community has helped at the Clarke farm, whether it is was the building of the Clarke home in 1949, helping with the seeding or harvest, fixing or maintaining equipment, pulling you out of the mud or snow or just being there to support you in a time of need.

When we have been able to return these gestures and help the neighbors and friends whenever we can, you understand the reward of giving as well as the gift of receiving.

When my Dad died in the spring of 1982 my good friend David Helstrom was there during seeding and harvest as we struggled to get through that first year.

There was that special day in February in the 1970’s when David and I went skidoo-ing one afternoon. The skies were blue and the fields were pure white, the heavy winds had filled the abandoned yard sites with drifting snow. We stopped atop the deep drifts and savored the moment of peace and quiet, understanding the meaning of friendship and life. Not a word was spoken.

Everyone knows the special magic of Doug Myers with his ability to fix anything, any time, anywhere. Doug Myers adopted the mission of ‘saving’ the Russell and Beryl Clarke family home, with the renovation and upgrading required when the plumbing, electrical, structural walls, windows and finishes wore out or failed over the years. What a transformation and comfort he has created in the Clarke family home.

In 2003 when we dedicated a heritage site at the family farm in memory of my father James Russell Clarke, it was a privilege to recognize the contribution of these good friends; Doug Myers for constructing the site and Dave Helstrom for creating the iron eterni-‘tree’ out of metal salvaged from machinery built by my dad and other farmers in the

community. This site will forever be a part of the Clarke heritage.

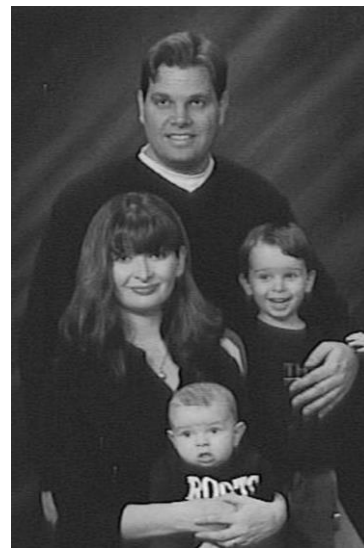
Family

Chad and Michelle now live in Edmonton with their two sons. Jacqui and David live in Calgary.

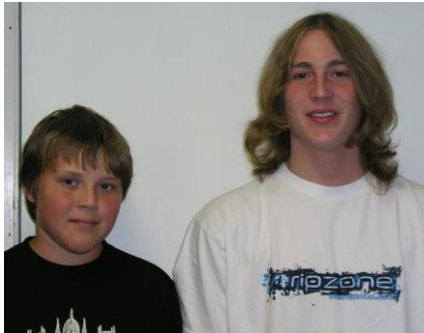

Leta passed away in October 1991, following a full and rewarding life. As a generous and community minded person, she remembered her favourite charities. She is missed by all those who knew her.

Ken and I are in good health, still loving the farm, and deeply involved in it. We are close to our families and see them often. Ron and Pam are living in Edmonton; we don't see them as often as we would like, but they are as close as the phone.

Ken curled with the same rink at Gray for over 30 years. It included Norton Frei at skip, Ken at third and Ron Lewis as second. The lead changed through the years, including Raymond Hannan, Drex Ford and Floyd Henry. Ken was always interested in the strategy of the games. They curled together 25 consecutive years in the Regina Bonspiel, but were back after a few years, with Norton tending his "pig operation". Their rink would enter this particular bonspiel, without having played a game, as Gray did not have artificial ice. However, that didn't stop the straight wins they built up. In 1955 they won the First event in the Leader Post bonspiel. In 1960 they won the Grand Aggregate, and their 1st and 2nd Events of the Leader Post and the Neil Motors. In 1968 they won the Grand Aggregate with fifteen straight wins, and these were the years of top rinks like the Richardson's of Regina, the Campbell's of Avonlea, Bob Pickering and Jack Keyes of Milestone, Harvey Mazinke and Billy Martin of Regina. The Frei rink always came home successful, with prizes. In 1966 the Frei rink curled in the Massey Curl-o-rama to represent Saskatchewan at the famed St. Georges Golf and Country Club in Toronto. Wives also went along on the trip and were royally treated by our hosts, including a Toronto Maple Leafs game at Maple Leaf Gardens. As a senior curler Ken still skips to winning top honours. He curls out of the Tartan Club in Regina, twice a week. He still loves curling as much as ever.

As a young girl, I always loved to sing. Growing up in the war years, there were many opportunities to sing at school concerts, concerts arranged for the enlisted men home on leave, and the church choir. It

was suggested that three of us form a "trio" and we were thrilled to perform for just the invitation. Later I found my way back to that love as a member of the Sweet Adelines, four-part harmony. Our Prairie Gold Chorus went to Vancouver for competitions in the Theatre for the Performing Arts March 16-20, 2005. Being successful there takes the winner to compete in the Internationals held this year at Las Vegas, NV. Is this a huge dream or what? Our visiting director of North Metro Chorus, June Dale of Toronto comes twice a year to coach us. She and her chorus have won gold four consecutive years in International Competitions...tops in the world. In 2003, our Prairie Gold Chorus earned the most points in competition for a small chorus in Internationals ever reached and has yet to be broken by another chorus. That earned us the position to compete in Greensville, NC in Internationals. We missed the Gold by one point, 1168 to their 1169. Second place in the world still felt very good! Last year moving into the medium sized chorus (43) we won the Gold in Saskatoon. In 2005 with the two top choruses dropping down from a large chorus size to our medium size, placed us third...still a proud place to be. This year (2005) our chorus held a very successful show "Exploring the Heart of Saskatchewan". It was held June 18 at the Sask. Centre for the Performing Arts. The show is all about small town Saskatchewan and included 'nouveau art' (elevators on each table with the name of a small town and Wheat Pool Logo, and the history of that particular small town, each written by the members of the chorus). Applause Theatre actors along with a rising singer songwriter rounded out our most successful show.

Ken and I have traveled quite extensively through the years; traveling across Canada stopping to visit friends and family, also to Hawaii, Florida, California and three cruises to the Caribbean.

In the early 70's we began to travel to the World Curling Silver Broom events in Bern, Switzerland, with a side trip to Portugal, Spain and Morocco. The Memorial Hall set up by the Estlin women housed the very interesting antiques "old and new" from the communities. An ice cream parlor served cake, cookies, pie, ice cream and drinks.

The rink served a steak dinner with homemade pie to over 500 people. The table centers were our "nouveau art elevators" (to replace the loss of the community serviced elevators now gone)...and bouquets of flowers. The success of the community event was surpassed only by the smiles on the faces of everyone there. On the 24th ball games were held in Riceton Sports Grounds and a pancake breakfast and box lunches were served to the crowd.

Our family was there together with the exception of Ron and Pam living in Sherwood Park, AB.

(Hendrickson) Byce, Lois pg 470

March 18, 1906 - December 6, 2001 As a young boy of eight or so in northern Oklahoma, Charlie began listening to stories told by an old harvest hand. This hand followed and worked the harvest each year from the Gulf of Mexico to the plains of Saskatchewan, and he had seen all sorts of conditions along the way.



One of the questions Charlie asked him was, "Where is the best place you've seen to farm in all your travels?" The fellow told him, "The Regina Plains of Saskatchewan. It is flat and rich and there aren't any rocks. It grows the best grain."

The harvest hand's stories he heard when he was a boy were the reasons Charlie wanted to farm in Saskatchewan. So in 1952 Charlie, along with his wife Beulah and daughter Karen Jane took a trip up through the Red River Valley of the Dakotas and on into Canada, entering in Manitoba and heading west to Saskatchewan. Neva Lafoy was my grade one teacher and my classmates for six years were Curt Lafoy, Ron Hendrickson and Chris Carnegie.
